Halloween Movie Night







Al die pracht van get heelal"



Working at a Startup with all Econometricians

Late May 2022, when I had been enrolled in the EOR master for so long that DUO didn't want to give me any more loans, it was time to find a job. Luckily for me, Florentijn Hogerwerf, a previous Econometrics student, had just started looking for current Econometrics students to hire as software engineers for his personal finance app start-up named Figy. I started working there in late June, incidentally the Monday after Members Weekend.






At the start, my role was to write the Android version of the app using the programming language Kotlin. Even though Kotlin is based on Java, which was not completely foreign to me, I had done everything in Python for a while at that point. So in those starting months, back when coding took longer than debugging because chat-gpt was not a thing yet, I had to first get used to Kotlin and as a lifelong Windows user also to writing on a Mac. Ended up getting used to Kotlin faster than using the Mac though, only figuring out how to right-click with two fingers a year later.





After getting used to Kotlin I started enjoying the programming work a lot (more than my uni work). In a way developing is one of the very few fields where a strategy of instant gratification works, namely by keeping the feedback loop small writing small blocks of code and immediately testing whether it works. So that was a nice realisation. What makes it even more enjoyable is that unlike sending large sums of stocks or currencies back and forth, building an app resembles a form of craftsmanship, which on top of that is also scalable. If you write the code for something as simple as a button it may not seem much at first, but in effect, you have just written something that will potentially get millions of interactions, so small things can have great impact.

Another aspect of the job that motivated me to working at Figy is the financial extensiveness that is at the core of the product. Whereas other personal finance apps focus on short-term cash flow planning, Figy fills a niche by catering to people who care about building wealth and want to become financially independent (at a young age). This requires a lot more complex calculations in the area of forecasting and analytics, to which I was able to apply things I learned in various OR courses, such as conceptualising and then writing algorithms that are both time and spaceefficient.



Research Lecture

An improved bound for the price of anarchy for related machine scheduling

The Research Lecture quadruple of the year continues. This period, we were excited to have PhD student Arman Rouhani to present some of his current results (under the supervision of Andre Berger and Marc Schroder). Also known for his tutor position in the 2nd year class of Programming, Arman's main area of focus lies in the Operational Research and Game Theory section of this university.

Hence, for the OR lecture of this year, we have learned something about machine scheduling, the price of anarchy and how Arman was able to find an improved bound on that price of anarchy. For a little context, machine scheduling refers to a problem where we have a number of jobs and a number of machines and we need to schedule the given jobs on the machines. Depending on what one is aiming for, there are different solutions to solve the problem. In this particular problem, it was aimed to find the shortest sum of completion times and the Shortest Processing Time (SPT) algorithm was adapted. With the SPT, one looks at the job with the shortest processing time and schedules it on an available machine. Next, the goal here was to improve the Price of Anarchy (PoA). This is defined as the ratio of the worst Nash equilibrium to the best optimal solution. They were able to do so by using previous results and making some adjustments to them.

Lastly, the night ended, as is tradition, with a night at the Preuv. Arman joined us for a while as well and we could get to know him a little better on a personal level. Overall, this lecture was quite the success given the considerably high attendance.

As for the next lecture, we will be inviting a former trader that will talk about his experiences at different firms and what is important to know about trading and the interview processes.















Valentin's Exchange in sunny California




Carnaval Costume Ideas




