





Econometrics Consultancy Tour

Vectum X ASSET (III) Econometrics

From February 21st until February 23rd, Vectum and Tilburg's Asset | Econometrics ventured to the capital of the Netherlands, in order to visit and get to know four different consulting firms as part of the annual Econometrics Consultancy Tour. This year, the firms that participated were EY, Capgemini, Rewire (formerly MICompany) and Vintura. The event was once again very insightful and I would like to give you a brief overview of it.

On Wednesday evening the 21st, a small delegation of Vectum made it to the lobby of hotel Best Western where we were staying for two nights. Awaiting the arrival of Asset, we got our portraits drawn by dedicated students coming from the far east who were staying in Amsterdam for a school trip. Feeling at home now, Asset arrived and we started up a Kahoot to get to know the firms we were about to visit in the next two days. The schedule was quite packed, so after no more than a few drinks, we slept in early for the following big day

Waking up to the alarm at 6am, we put on our fanciest business casual outfits and grabbed a great breakfast at the hotel, before making our way to the renowned Zuidas, where EY expected us. We went up all the way to the 21st floor, where, being seated at a giant oval table, we got enlightened on the intricacies of working at Ernst & Young. Impressive as it was, we had little time to process it as an important duty was calling us; finding out who of the F1 drivers was .. in the murder of Sebastian Vettel, through the careful inspection of heaps of data. This case was very fun to do, and by presenting the results afterwards, we learned valuable presentation-skills tips, like the importance of nice slides, keeping it short and concise, etc., which we could implement at the consulting firms that followed.















Next up was Capgemini, who focused their presentation on being a particularly data-driven consulting firm. Their case was about creating the most profitable medium-term strategy for a global waste management company. Carried out in groups of 4, Vectum & Asset members mixed up, and got to know each other on a more professional level. After discussing the case's results through small presentations, a delectable dinner was prepared for us, and we learned from one particular colleague about the importance of scooping enough chicken on your plate by means of a demonstration. Some of us decided to end the day and take a walk in the lovely city center of Amsterdam.

The following day we started the day by taking the tram and visiting Rewire (formerly known as MICompany). Compared to the other firms, Rewire has a greater focus on Machine Learning and AI. Their focus in consultancy lies in creating a product that is easy to use and that learns from the data to come such that the company asking for the product has an answer for the future and not just for today. The case at Rewire was about lowering waste at a supermarket brand; it was split into several parts: Using the knowledge learned from the presentation, we had to create a dashboard that would show how the product would be used. Ultimately, the product should be an easy to use website where the supermarket can input location, bread type, and more that would help them forecast the amount of breads they would have to produce for the given day. After determining the winner, we took a group picture on the terrace of their office.

We ended our trip at Vintura, a firm specialized in medical consultancy. Here, we had a whole new perspective on what the case asked us to do. Rather than giving us data to use, we had to "interview" different parties involved in the release of medical treatments (patients, government, pharma companies) and gather insights into their beliefs on the current process. After taking everyone's interviews, we had to come up with a summary on the current process and if applicable, give advice on what can be improved. The day ended with a great dinner at the office and possibilities to talk to all possible employees of Vintura.
